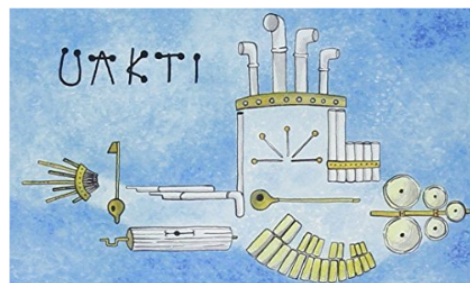

Uakti (WAHK-chee) is a Brazilian instrumental musical group known for using custom-made instruments built by themselves, out of PVC tubes, wood, glass, and tin cans. Environmentally, this reduces the carbon footprint compared to the marimbas made of the endangered rosewood.

Did you know?

Global warming means more evaporation and more moisture in the atmosphere. Every 1 degree F rise in temperature can mean 4% more water vapor in the air. Humans have eliminated many natural features that would otherwise slow rainwater's path across lands.

Elena Kats-Chernin:

Symphonia Eluvium (Symphony of the Floods) for chorus and orchestra (2011)

Documentary on the piece filmed by the ABC Network Australia

This piece is a reflection of the devastating floods in Queensland (2011). The disaster touched over 200,000 people, causing deaths and thousands of evacuations. The composer captures the “emotional turbulence of the flood”, expressing optimism for reconstruction.

Sonata for Violin and Piano No. 2, 'Mount Ida' (Kaz Dağları), Op. 82 (2019), II. Wounded Bird

Performed by Friedemann Eichhorn (violin) and Fazil Say (piano)

In the composer's words: "I, along with the people of Turkey, have been very much affected by the massacre of nature that happened at Mount Ida (in 2019, gold mining activities led to widespread deforestation). The work's main theme is inspired by this catastrophic incident."

Did you know?

As a result of global warming, we lose Arctic sea ice at a rate of almost 13% per decade.

With less ice, more intense heat waves are expected worldwide. On the other hand, more extreme winters could happen as a counter effect while sea levels would not stop rising.

Ludovico Einaudi: Elegy for the Arctic (2016)

Einaudi performs his original piece on a floating platform in the Arctic Ocean, against the backdrop of the Wahlenbergreen glacier (NO). In collaboration with GreenPeace, this track supports the opening of a possible first protected area in Arctic international waters.

Did you know?

Over the last 800,000 years, the concentration of CO₂ in the atmosphere has fluctuated maintaining acceptable levels for the planet. However, in the last 170 years, the increase has skyrocketed, currently reaching an unsustainable extent due to greenhouse gases emissions.



Daniel Crawford:

Planetary Bands, Warming World (2015)

Performed by Julian Maddox, Jason Shu, Alastair Witherspoon and Nygel Witherspoon

Using surface temperature analysis from NASA, the composers link each instrument to a specific part of the Northern Hemisphere: the pitch of each note is tuned to the average annual temperature in each region, following the principle of “low-cold” and “high-warm”.

Dichlorodiphenyltrichloroethane, commonly known as DDT, is a colourless, tasteless, and almost odourless crystalline chemical compound, an organochlorine. Originally developed as an insecticide, it became infamous for its dangerous environmental impacts.

Let Them Not Say (2021)

The Piedmont Singers of Central VA, Helena von Rueden

“Let Them Not Say” was released on Earth Day in 2021 as part of #ChoirsForClimate. The pitch of the soprano lines is symbolic of global warming; each phrase’s pitch is based on the temperature since 1979, and it slowly rises throughout the work.

Uranium is used for its chemical properties as fuel for nuclear reactors.

Regardless of how uranium is removed from rock, the extraction process creates radioactive wastes. If not managed properly, mining waste and mill tailings can contaminate the environment.

Peter Maxwell Davies: Farewell to Stromness (late 1970s) *Performed by Adrian Lord*

This track is part of The Yellow Cake Revue, a collection of cabaret songs and recitations. Davies wrote this piece to protest against the construction of the uranium mine in Stromness, Scotland. The word "Yellowcake" is a reference to the uranium found there.

About 7% of Ghana's land area is considered coastal, and about a quarter of the country's population resides there. Some 37% of the country's coastal land was lost to erosion and flooding between 2005 and 2017. In 2021, nearly 4000 people in Keta district were displaced.
