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Theme and teaser

After being in the South, let's go back to the North! <u>LUCA School of the Arts in Leuven</u>, Belgium, is opening its doors to all participants joining the <u>2023 AEC Annual Meeting for International</u> <u>Relations Coordinators entitled "Opening Doors: Adopting a More Inclusive Perspective.</u>" This event, organized in the framework of the EU Creative Europe co-funded project "<u>ARTEMIS – Empowering Artists as Makers in Society</u>," invites higher music education institutions' international relations coordinators to adopt a more inclusive perspective while looking at the themes close to the daily business of any international relations coordinator: mobility, employability, diversity, international cooperation and digitization. The meeting has been designed mostly as an in-presence one, but online pre-conference sessions will be organized on 8th and 13th September and all Plenary Sessions and their follow up discussions will be streamed from Leuven for online participants.</u>

Unleashing the Power of Diversity and Inclusion

Workshops by the <u>IncluMusic</u> and <u>TUNE</u> projects, our keynote speaker <u>Aygul Gunaltay Weyler</u> and the "Safe Space" group discussion moderated by the <u>AEC Gender Equality and Non-discrimination</u> <u>Mainstreaming Task Force</u> will help participants discovering innovative approaches to fostering diversity and inclusion in higher music education institutions and in our communities by promoting an environment that celebrates artistic and personal differences. The goal is to learn how to create an inclusive and diverse ecosystem that opens its doors to different genres and genders and nurtures creativity, collaborations, equality and personal growth and well being.

Digitization and Artificial Intelligence: Revolutionizing the Music Education Landscape

The ARTEMIS Digitisation working group and the <u>FAST45 Project</u> will open a door on the future of higher music education by exploring the dynamic interplay between digitization, artificial intelligence and society within future possible scenarios for our sector. Cutting-edge technologies that amplify pedagogical possibilities, expand access to music education and exchanges, and transform the way we teach, learn, create music and cooperate will be explored: blended mobility will be addressed by the <u>TUNE project</u> and by the session on Erasmus Blended Intensive Programmes (BIPs); the digitisation of administrative procedures that comes with the Erasmus Without Paper initiative will be addressed during the <u>EASY Mobility Online</u> workshop and session.

Global Cooperation Beyond Europe: Forging Stronger Connections.

International cooperation, transcending borders and opening doors to higher music education institutions worldwide, will be addressed – on the conceptual side – by two sessions on the idea of Global Musician by the keynote speaker <u>Anothai Nithibon</u> and – on the practical side – during the session on International Credit Mobility (Erasmus Key Action 171). Participants will be invited to share best practices to cultivate fruitful collaborations, establish connections beyond Europe, and foster cultural understanding to shape a global community of IRC.

The networking opportunities offered during the event, including our traditional final "Share your Food and Drinks" from our countries and a special tour of the charming Flemish city of Leuven on Friday afternoon, will forge lasting connections with international peers. In the session dedicated to environmental sustainability by the ARTEMIS working group AEC Goes Green, practical strategies by AEC member institutions to build a greener future will be shared and discussed; the transformative potential of international internships for music students and graduates, internationalisation at home and lifelong learning for graduates and staff will be addressed by dedicated sessions and discussion groups aimed at opening doors to institutional and personal growth and career development.



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
Online Pre-conference Workshop A - TUNE

Developing intercultural understanding through blended exchange in **traditional/folk music** higher education

TUNE (Traditional Music Undergraduate Network in Europe) is a 3-year Erasmus+ Cooperation Partnership project (2021–2024) that aims to promote strategic cooperation between five European higher music education institutions through the development of an innovative joint module in traditional music based on blended mobility.

During this online session, leaders of the project's work packages presented some of the different ways that **students have worked together** online and in person during the first three semesters of the project.

In particular, the presentation focused on how **international cooperation and exchange in the field of traditional/folk music** higher education can foster the **development of intercultural understanding**. The progress of the joint module was also presented and discussed. This session also served as an introduction to a pre-conference workshop and parallel session about the project, that took place at the AEC Congress and General Assembly on 9 and 10 November 2023 in The Hague.



Online Pre-conference Workshop B - Lifelong Learning

Opening doors through Lifelong Learning, by the **ARTEMIS Lifelong** Learning working group

Opening doors through Lifelong Learning, by the ARTEMIS Lifelong Learning working group. In the frame of the AEC - Empowering Artists as Makers in Society project (ARTEMIS, 2022-2025), co-funded by the Creative Europe programme of the European Commission, the Lifelong Learning WG has conducted a **survey on Lifelong Learning opportunities offered within and beyond the AEC network**.

The Lifelong Learning WG is currently **collecting, mapping and analysing** the survey results in order to identify gaps in **Lifelong Learning provisions**. At the AEC IRCs meeting, the Lifelong Learning Working Group presented the first findings of the survey, providing attendees with valuable insights into the current state of Lifelong Learning opportunities in Europe.

In the second part of the session, attendees had the opportunity to engage in an open discussion, sharing Lifelong Learning opportunities available in their own institutions and countries, and **exploring the potential benefits of Lifelong Learning for IRCs**. Overall, this session aimed to deepen participants' understanding of the context and importance of Lifelong Learning and foster meaningful discussions on the topic.

Pre-Conference Workshops

IncluMusic: a roadmap towards a more inclusive Higher Music Education

Members of **IncluMusic** (strategic partnership project co-funded by the European Commission's Erasmus+ programme and coordinated by the Academia Națională de Muzică "Gheorghe Dima" in Cluj Napoca, Romania) delivered a workshop for participants to know more about the different methods through which **students with special education needs (SEN) in Higher Music Education (HME) can be integrated**, and how teaching in this area is delivered at the national and European levels. Moreover, the workshop provided room for discussions around a new professional role, the 'Academic Tutor, aimed at monitoring social inclusion practices within HME institutions.

The session took place in plenary and small discussion groups, challenging participants to try looking through the lens of a SEN student and making them understand what is required in order for them to develop skills in the music field. The outcomes collected by project partners will help develop a tailored project training course, to be officially presented towards the end of the project period. All contributions were highly valuable and had a significant impact in the development of the project outputs.

AEC Talk 2

Opening Doors through Inclusion

Aygül Günaltay-Weyler, Music Director and Conductor of the 'Brussels International Amity Orchestra'

moderated by Frauke Velghe, IRC working group

The presentation focused on good practice of several initiatives and examples projects at the EU level, aiming to raise awareness, questions, and discussions on the utilization of music to enhance diversity and inclusion practices. The topic was contextualized from various angles by taking practice-based experiences and observations both local on and international levels as a starting point and moving up to the meta-level.

Parallel Sessions I

1 - Reflection and discussion on Inclusion

This session is a follow-up of the AEC Talk on Inclusion. **Kim Fallen Bailey** and **Jessica Harris** from the Royal Irish Academy of Music in Dublin oopened the panel by addressing the biases and barriers and proposing solutions to open doors and give better access to music education. **Oana Balan** gave a short presentation with outcomes and results of the IncluMusic Project, focusing on how teachers can provide support to inclusion. **Katrien Faubert** from LUCA School of Arts gave a short presentation of research at LUCA with action points for the upcoming years. How can we bring students in contact with others outside of the campus?

After those inputs, the floor was given to the participants who were invited to present the situation at their institutions with the aim to engage in an interactive discussion with the panelists.



2 - BIPs and short mobilities - examples and exchanges of good practices

Given the interest in the Blended Intensive Programmes (BIPs) and the large number of responses to the questionnaire sent to the IRCs earlier this year, the focus in this session was about discussing the bottlenecks, practical difficulties, workload and administrative approaches to tackle such a collaboration. Examples from Belgian Conservatoires were presented, as well as some tips and tricks. Participants as well were invited to present their approach to BIPs.

3 - Opening global doors - a closer look into KA171 projects and partnerships with third countries

Aino Jalkanen (Sibelius Academy, University of the Arts Helsinki), Milena Osiecka (Academy of Music in Gdansk), Rossella Gaudenzi (Saint Louis College of Music in Rome) moderated by Iveri Kekenadze Gustafsson, IRC working group.

The panel discussion featuring international relations coordinators (IRCs) from diverse institutions, explored the opportunities and challenges of developing, implementing, and administering ICM KA171 projects. IRCs shared the best practice examples from their first-hand and broad experience.

Since its establishment in 2015, Erasmus+ International Credit Mobility (ICM) has been a gamechanger in developing partnerships with institutions outside the Erasmus+ programme and associated countries. ICM projects, designed to encourage mobilities of individual students and staff, have been significant internationalisation instruments for those in non-associated countries. Those projects often affect policy formation and administration, cause organisational change, and improve study environments in third-country institutions. Simultaneously, International Credit Mobility enhances European higher music education institutions' internationalisation efforts and fosters diverse, inclusive and global approaches in their organisations.



4 - Going Green - Presentation and discussion on sustainable practices, moderated by the AEC Goes Green working group

Findings from the AEC Goes Green Survey on Green and Eco-Sustainable Needs and Practices in Higher Music Education launched in Spring 2023 showed high personal concern regarding the climate change and environmental problems, with over 56% respondents stating the highest level of interest. The rates significantly drop when considering the level and possibility of personal (19,3% rated it the highest value) and institutional (21,1%) contribution to the green transition in the HME sector.

In this session, the AEC Goes Green WG addressed the gap between the expressed care for the health of our planet and the possibility of practical personal and institutional contribution to its greener future. They also discussed the guidelines for environmental sustainability in Erasmus, Creative Europe and other funding programs, the role of the international relations coordinators in communicating and implementing them, as well as share some concerns and practices related to reducing the HME institutions' daily, educational and artistic work impact on climate and the environment.





5 - Employability: traineeships, best practices and challenges

In this session, two very different models on how to organize students' internships abroad was presented: on one side, **Elsa Ferreira** showed how internship opportunities are presented, organized and followed up at the Royal Conservatoire in The Hague, The Netherlands; **Lucia Di Cecca** responded to Elsa's presentation by showing the experience of the Italian consortium for internships "Working With Music" a successful story that provided dozen of Italian conservatoires' graduates with working opportunities abroad for 12 years. The two models were compared and differences were highlighted. **Francesco Spina**, former AEC intern and former EPASA board member, now employed by ENCACT, spoke about his various internship experiences abroad during and after his studies. The floor was opened to the audience to discuss challenges and opportunities of international internships and how a future online platform for international internships managed by the AEC could help IRCs and students open up this opportunity to a larger audience.

AEC Talk 3

Artificial Intelligence in Higher Music Education

Artificial intelligence is on everyone's lips these days. What are we talking about? What are its uses in music? And in music education? After a general overview to understand AI, they took a look at a number of examples of use in musical practice and also talk about the immediate challenges posed by Large Language Models to established methods of assessment, propose strategies for navigating these challenges and discuss the opportunities that may emerge in responding to the use of this technology in higher music education. The AEC ARTEMIS Digitisation Working Group is composed by international digital experts belonging to AEC Member Institutions. The group helps the AEC assisting HMEIs in dealing with the digital shift (which is affecting their own practices and educational methods, as well as the way in which artists interact with their audience). The group also collects and analyses data to ultimately provide guidance to the sector on how to develop and test tools that have been created to both practice distance learning and teaching as well as enhance digitally supported remote ensemble play.

AEC Talk 4

Opening Doors for the Global Musician – Enhancing Intercultural Communication Through Exchanges

In this presentation, Anothai compared and examined findings from previous discussions on how the creation of global musicians can enhance their employability and opportunities. Drawing on experiences from Southeast Asia, the speakers explored how traditional music can be included in educational institutions and show how embracing musical diversity in curricula can enrich students' own cultures. The presentation emphasized the significance of intercultural competence in our interconnected world, underscoring the power of global cooperation in music to foster intercultural understanding through meaningful exchanges.



Discussion groups

Reflection on the conference and future topics, moderated by the IRC working group members

On Saturday, before the closing session, participants were allocated to seven discussion groups to facilitate reflections on the event moderated by IRC WG members. This interactive session provided an opportunity for attendees to share their thoughts and insights about the IRC meeting.

During these discussions, participants expressed their satisfaction with various aspects of the event. Some highlighted engaging keynote presentations, interesting panel discussions, and the overall positive atmosphere. The diverse perspectives and expertise brought by the speakers and attendees contributed to the richness of the discussions throughout the conference.

Closing Session
